History, Legend, and Narratives: Literary Afterlife of Myths



Dr. Nehama Aschkenasy is Professor of Comparative Literary & Cultural Studies at UConn and founding Director of the Center for Judaic & Middle Eastern Studies at UConn, Stamford. She is the author of three books (among them the award-winning *Eve's Journey*) and numerous book chapters and articles in Judaic studies, women in literature, Israeli literature, English and Comparative literature. She also guest-edited a dedicated volume of the *AJS Review* (28:1), consisting of invited articles by major Judaic scholars, to which she contributed an article and a methodological Introduction. She has served on the Editorial Board of several academic publications and as guest scholar at many academic institutions and community study retreats in the US, Canada, and Europe.



The Rev. Dr. Blaine Edele is currently Pastor of Union Memorial Church in Stamford, CT. He has a Ph.D. from the Department of Religion at Duke University; the topic of his doctoral dissertation was A Critical Edition of Genesis in Ethiopic. The Rev. Edele serves as Chair of the Interfaith Advisory Committee for the Center for Judaic & Middle Eastern Studies at UConn, Stamford and conducts its interfaith seminars. He also frequently serves as Guest Professor in courses in Bible and the study of Religion, and in the Center's Lunch & Learn programs.

Dr. Glenda Abramson was born in Johannesburg, South Africa and educated in Israel; she received her Ph. D. from the University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg. Formerly Cowley Lecturer in Post-Biblical Hebrew at the University of Oxford, she now holds the titles of Professor of Hebrew and Jewish Studies and Emeritus Fellow of the Oxford Centre for Hebrew and Jewish Studies. Her publications include *Modern Hebrew Drama*, *The Writing of Yehuda Amichai*, and *Drama and Ideology in Modern Israel*. Among edited books: *The Encyclopedia of Modern Jewish Culture*, *The Oxford Book of Hebrew Short Stories*, *Religious Perspectives in Modern Muslim and Jewish Literatures* (with Hilary Kilpatrick) and *Essays on Modern Hebrew literature and Jewish Culture*. Professor Abramson is editor of *The Journal of Modern Jewish Studies*.
